1. What is the main aim or purpose of the strategy/policy/project?

A Supplementary Planning Document can be prepared by the Council in order to provide further detail, guidance and clarification to adopted Local Plan policies.

The Workington Town Centre SPD will provide a framework to guide development in the town centre which will promote regeneration, encourage investment into the area and facilitate positive change. It will be used to ensure that developments that come forward in the town centre contribute to the vision and objectives for the town centre which are set out in this document. It also identifies potential new uses for the town centre which reflect the changing nature of town centres and the move away from a dominant retail focus.

2. List the main activities or objectives of the strategy/policy/project (for strategies list the main policy areas):

The document seeks to:

- Identify a vision and strategic objectives for Workington town centre
- Identify ways to develop the town centre based upon four key themes:
 - improve connectivity and movement to/within the town centre;
 - reusing empty properties and introducing residential uses in the town centre;
 - improving the environment (including public realm, open space,

- green space, gateway enhancements and design); and
- o identifying key sites in the town centre for investment

3. Who will be the main beneficiaries of the strategy/policy/project and in what way?

The document sets out how the Council wishes to see development take place within Workington town centre. The beneficiaries will include those who wish to develop in the town centre, as it provides guidance as to what the Council expects. Should the SPD be complied with, it will provide benefits to residents, visitors and workers who use the town centre as the offer of the town centre should expand, it should be easier to access and the environment will become more pleasant with more green infrastructure and strong design features.
